
THE MEMORY GARDEN

BACKGROUND

According to Jewish tradition, no formal burial or funeral is held for a miscarriage, stillbirth, or for an infant who dies before eight days of age. The traditional mourner's prayer, Kaddish, is not recited nor is the seven-day mourning period of Shiva observed. Given the high infant-mortality rate of generations past, these customs were developed to nurture and protect families. Today we hesitate less than those before us to discuss our losses. We are more likely to seek comfort and strength in not only naming our losses, but also in memorializing them.

OPEN FOR HEALING

Many people seek ways to heal and end the isolation that can accompany pregnancy loss. VISION

The dream for The Memory Garden began when two local Jewish mothers, Debbie Findling and Abby Porth, who had each suffered pregnancy losses, began to imagine a place where parents, prospective parents, and others could go to reflect, pray, mourn, and heal. They launched The Memory Garden to recognize the value of Jewish memorial space and ritual for grappling with these losses.



When Sinai Memorial Chapel was presented with the vision for The Memory Garden, it embraced a leadership role in making it a reality. Sinai has always viewed the death of an infant as the community's loss of potential that requires a communal response and thus serves families in these instances without charge.
